

If you are looking for something easy to plant these school holidays then potatoes are perfect for this time of year. They will be ready to harvest for Christmas! You can plant them direct in to the soil or into bags and it is the best feeling to dig up the golden treasure, the kids absolutely love it (as do !!)

RECIPE:

Coconut and Almond Cookies

By Meagan (Hugh's mum in Finches class)



These cookies are Gluten free, vegan and super easy to make!

1 cup of shredded coconut1 cup of almond meal1/4 - 1/3 cup of Maple Syrup (to taste)

Add the coconut and almond meal to a blender or food processor. Blitz only for a short time (10 seconds) as you pour the maple syrup in. Ensure mixture is incorporated without over blitzing. Over blitzing will result in dry cookies.

Shape mixture into balls and place on a baking sheet.

Bake in a 160 degree oven for approximately 15 minutes or until golden brown.

Optional: Top with chocolate drizzle. We like to use the Pana baking chocolate.





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
CRAFTS: 8-Pointed Window Star



Select 8 sheets of kite paper. I used 16cm by 16cm but these can be cut down to smaller squares if you want to make smaller stars (or you can purchase smaller sized kite paper).



Using a glue stick, layer the kites into a star shape as per the picture. You need to line up the kite with the middle fold of the one you are sticking it to. Stick down any flaps that are needing to be secured.







Take one piece of kite paper and fold corner to corner so it makes a triangle shape. Now unfold.



When you get to the final kite then you will need to stick it right in the middle of two points as per the picture. Now your star is complete!





Fold each of the points inwards as per the picture to make a kite shape. Repeat steps two and three for all eight sheets of kite paper.





Use the glue stick to adhere straight to the glass of your window. Enjoy the brightness it brings to your days!





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CRAFTS: Snowflake



Trace a circle onto a sheet of white paper. I used standard A4 printer paper. You could also use kite paper or anything that takes your fancy.



Cut out the circle.



Fold in half. Fold again. Then fold again. A total of 3 folds.



Chop little patterns along every edge. I did a combination of triangles and circular shapes. Anything goes. The more patterns that are chopped then the more detail the snowflake will have.



Unfold to see your pretty snowflake surprise!



Use the glue stick to adhere straight to the glass of your window. Make a number of snowflakes for a stronger effect.
